1. Before choosing a hosting path

Write the answers down. If nobody can answer these, that is the first infrastructure problem to solve.

- 01 Inventory websites, databases, DNS, email, certificates, cron jobs, and storage.
- 02 Confirm current and future domain control.
- 03 Measure actual CPU, memory, disk, and bandwidth needs.
- 04 Prepare backups before changing anything.
- 05 Lower DNS TTL only when it is useful to the cutover plan.
- 06 Define a rollback condition and keep the old environment available during validation.

2. Match the workload to a DotMoose path

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| Hosting | A simple starting point for conventional websites. |
| VPS | Custom applications and services needing root access. |
| Dedicated | Larger workloads and physical-server requirements. |
| Backups | Independent recovery storage before and after migration. |
