1. Before choosing a hosting path

- 04 Website backups exist outside the live hosting account.
- 05 The website platform and responsible maintainer are documented.
- 06 There is a written process for moving the site if the provider changes.

Domains Keep the business domain deliberately managed.

Backups Maintain a separate recovery copy.
